You informed me that the property in question is to change ownership. The change in property ownership will require a permit modification, on the part of Ozone Waste Solutions, consisting of the following information;

1. A cover letter from Ozone Waste Solutions explaining the ownership change (parties involved, property involved, when change occurred, etc).
2. Attached to the cover letter Ozone Waste Solutions should attached a copy of the new recorded deed and new owners contact information.
3. The above steps must occur no later than 30 days after change in property ownership.
4. Once the above information is received Ozone Waste Solutions will then be invoiced for a permit modification fee of \$500.

Note: this is a totally different process from that required of the owner/operator (Ozone Waste Solutions) changing ownership, which is a much more involved process.

Once the appropriate information is received, reviewed and approved, and fees are paid, the modified permit will be issued. Once issued the permit will need to be recorded against the new deed within 30 days.

As long as Ozone Waste Solutions keeps me updated as to progress of the ownership change process, there should be no effect on the operational status of the facility. Failure to communicate on the part of owners/operators may be considered a permit violation.
