Subject: Pre-Regulatory Landfill Sites in Carteret County

Dear Mr. Langdon:

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacted Senate Bill 1492 which created a program to assess the public health and environmental hazards at landfill and dump sites that operated prior to 1983 and to develop and implement remedial action plans at sites requiring remediation. The Pre-Regulatory Landfill Unit (Unit) was created in the Inactive Hazardous Sites Branch (IHSB) to oversee these activities. The purpose of this letter is to make you aware of the sites identified in your county and to provide general guidance of relevant state statutes.

Based on the information obtained by the Unit, the sites listed below tentatively qualify under Senate Bill 1492.

Work at these sites may be performed using the Unit's resources or through local government actions. The Unit has prioritized the sites statewide based on their threat to public health and the environment and

will perform assessments and implement remedial actions based on this priority. Local governments may opt to perform the work at any time under the guidance of the Unit. Reimbursement of local government costs may be available for assessments and remedial actions to abate an imminent hazard as funds are available. The conditions for reimbursement include approval of the assessment and remediation plan by the Unit and certified accounting of costs. A document, IHSB *Guidelines for Addressing Old Landfills & Dumps*, was developed to assist local governments and the Unit in this work. It is available on our web site, [http://wastenotnc.org/sfhome/IHSBRNCH\\_OldLandfills.HTM](http://wastenotnc.org/sfhome/IHSBRNCH_OldLandfills.HTM) , for your review.

An additional purpose in notifying you of these sites is to provide information to assist in your responsibilities in the permitting of private drinking water wells. The General Assembly enacted legislation which required local health departments to implement programs for the permitting, inspecting, and testing of private drinking water wells by July 1, 2008. State well construction standards in 15A NCAC 2C require a minimum horizontal separation of 500 feet between a water supply well and a landfill or disposal site. More precise location information for the sites in your county may be requested from the Unit.

Subject: Assessment, Cleanup, and Redevelopment of Old Landfill Sites Within Your Jurisdiction

Dear <SAL> <LAST>:

Governor Easley released his proposed budget February 22, 2007. Included in the budget is a specific item I believe should be of interest to you from a fiscal, environmental and public health protection perspective.

There are approximately 700 old landfills statewide and <LANDFILL#> old landfills in your local area that closed before the State permitting system became effective. These landfills are listed on the Old Landfill Sites portion of the Inactive Hazardous Sites Inventory maintained by the Superfund Section, Division of Waste Management. Any person, including local governments, that arranged for disposal or disposed of waste in the landfills may be held liable for the cleanup of the site. I have attached a report that identifies the location of known old landfill sites in <COUNTY NAME> County that may have closed prior to 1983 and thus qualify for the program described in this letter.

The Division has surveyed old landfills in 47 counties. The results of the survey indicate reason for concern about potential public health and safety impacts of these sites if they are not addressed. Seventy percent of the sites surveyed had a school, church, residence, day care or drinking water source within 1000 feet. The Division has found 102 old landfills that have a drinking water well within 500 feet. Thirteen of the landfills surveyed have residences built over the old landfill. The cost of assessment and cleanup of these old landfill sites can be as high as several million dollars.

Governor Easley's budget establishes a partnership between the State and local governments to both clean up the old landfill sites and provide funding for redevelopment of the sites. Many are in prime locations for redevelopment opportunities. The Governor's budget proposes to pay for cleanup and redevelopment of these sites through a surcharge on disposal of solid waste. The funding mechanism is a fair one. It is based on the idea that those who use solid waste disposal facilities should share responsibility for cleanup of sites used for solid waste disposal in the past that may have been lawful at the time, but did not meet standards that we now know are necessary to protect public health and safety.

The proposed \$2.00 per ton disposal surcharge would apply to residential, commercial, industrial, and construction and demolition debris type waste that is either disposed at a landfill or passes through a transfer station for disposal out-of-state. The State would use revenue from the surcharge to contract for cleanup of the old landfill sites and to provide grants to local government for redevelopment. The funds could also be used across the state to clean up other hazardous substance disposal sites that have no viable responsible party.

The only tool currently available to the State to ensure cleanup when it is needed is an enforcement action against those who owned, operated, or contributed to old landfills. The Governor's proposal would avoid placing an unreasonable

burden on any one local government and allow us to use our resources for actual cleanup rather than legal action. When old landfill sites were in use, North Carolina citizens, businesses, and industries benefited from their existence as a place to dispose of waste. The surcharge on waste disposal is a way for citizens, businesses, and industries to form a partnership for cleanup and redevelopment of these old landfill sites.

There is great interest this session of the General Assembly in strengthening requirements for landfills permitted in North Carolina. I encourage you to take a close look at legislation that will be introduced, specifically this initiative and what it can bring to your jurisdiction.



The time of the inspection was Friday, 11:00 a.m. I was told by the  
complaintant that it was a practice of the sanitation department of  
leaving the trucks on this lot until Monday a.m.

Also, on the city property in the residential section, the refuse from  
the street sweeper machine is dumped on the ground and was not adequately  
covered.

We recommend that the garbage trucks be cleaned and sanitized after each

Dear Mr. Morris:

Several things have come to our attention concerning the present lease you have with the State. These are in the nature of discrepancies in the operation of your camp and the use of the water system.

The State has had the water system on the premises inspected by health officials and they have found the water unfit for human consumption. It is therefore necessary to inform you that the State can no longer include the water system in its lease and that it will be posted by the health authorities. The State will not be responsible for any claims, damages, or obligations or suits arising out of or in any manner connected with the use of this system.

Another item is the open garbage dump you have in the property. The health authorities found this to be a severe health hazard and in need of immediate correction. This garbage will have to be removed to the mainland for disposal. Furthermore, all garbage in the future must be collected and removed to the mainland and no accumulations will be allowed on State property.

All refrigerators, iceboxes, or other containers which have been discarded, abandoned or left in an unsafe manner must be made safe. By this we mean to remove the door, crate, strap or lock any iceboxes, refrigerators or other containers to such an extent that it is impossible for a child to obtain access to any air-tight compartment thereof.

The last item is the steady growth of your camp from a few structures to a number exceeding twenty. This growth must cease. Therefore, in the future no new structures may be erected on the property without the express written consent of the State.

In bringing about these changes desired, it is necessary to exercise our option to cancel your present lease and we are hereby giving you thirty (30) days notice as provided in paragraph six (6) of the lease.

We are enclosing a new lease incorporating therein the items discussed above. You will note that the new lease runs for the same period of time as the lease we are cancelling and will be at no additional cost. Please execute the same and return both copies to this office for execution by the State. We will return the duplicate original to you after it has been executed.

**REPORT:**

On August 28, 1975, I accompanied Mr. William T. Biggers, Assistant to the Secretary, Department of Administration and Mr. Jerry Perkins, Assistant Head, Solid Waste Section, Division of Health Services to the Core Banks. The purpose of this trip was to survey the facilities of the fishing camps located on the Core Banks.

The Core Banks are owned by the State of North Carolina and were purchased in 1961. The State leases eight huts or buildings and a water system to Mr. Don Morris for a fee of \$150.00 per year. At the present time, in the Morris fish camp, there are approximately 26 buildings or huts. Mr. Morris is, at present, renting 14 units out on a daily basis for a fee of \$5.00 per person per night. He furnishes the linens. The rental units are very crude consisting of one room each, in which are beds, a table, sink, and stove. There is no hot water provided. The walls and ceilings are very crude and in no way complys with our lodging regulations. Some units are provided with a commode, lavatory and shower and this room is also crudely constructed and has no hot water. The water system for the Morris camp is provided by a 1 $\frac{1}{4}$  inch well approximately 112 feet deep and equipped with a 200 gallon elevated storage tank. The storage tank is a fuel oil drum. This water supply does not meet the requirements and is classified as an unapproved system. The method of sewage disposal is by one of four ways:

1. a 60 gallon oil drum with the bottom cut out and no drainfield
2. a 4' x 4' x 4' plywood box with no bottom or drainfield
3. a hole dug in the sand
4. empties on ground

In addition to the rental units of Mr. Morris, other individuals have dwellings within Mr. Morris' camp and are receiving water from his well. The following are names and addresses of these individuals:

There are four other fishing camps on the Core Banks. None of these camps are under lease with the State. Individuals have come in and built camps. In each one of these there are units being rented which do not comply with lodging requirements, the water supplies are not approved and the method of sewage disposal is not approved. During this survey we were only able to contact two camp managers. Mr. Don L. Morris, Morris Marina, Atlantic, N. C. 225-4261, and Mr. E. G. Hamilton, Dixon's Fish Camp, P. O. Box 43, Davis, N. C., 729-2962. The other three camps are managed by Mr. Algie Davis, Mr. Murphy and Mr. Davis.

The conclusion after making this survey is that these fishing camps do not comply with our state law governing the sanitation of lodging places, they do not comply with our rules and regulations regarding sewage disposal and they do not comply with our rules and regulations governing water supplies, private and community.

Mr. Perkins, of the Solid Waste Section, will report on the solid waster problem in a separate report.

This office appreciates very much your interest in bringing this disposal site into full compliance.

As was explained to you and your landfill operator the site that you now operate is and always will be an expensive operation due to the means of securing cover material and the distance this cover material must be hauled.

The reason for this letter is to explain that cover material that is secured from below the ground water table, as it is on your site, must be stockpiled so the free water will drain before it is used as cover material.



This is in reference to your application for additional area at the Sanitary Landfill to stockpile automobiles. We have inspected the area and discussed it in considerable detail with Commissioner Ken Newsom and James Griffin.

A check of the area made today reveals that both North Carolina State Board of Health standards and U. S. Forest Service permit conditions (Item 27) are not being met in that refuse is not spread, compacted and covered as required. We could not allow additional area and extension of a permit where existing use conditions are violated.

If you will bring the existing Landfill to acceptable standards within the next 30 days, we'll certainly reconsider your application.


