I just discovered that chloride has a "National Secondary Drinking Water Standard" of 250 ug/l. It says that these are non-enforceable but EPA recommends compliance because they "may cause cosmetic effects (such as skin or tooth discoloration) or aesthetic effects (such as taste, odor, or color)"

It also says that states may choose to adopt these standards.
