Ms. Harris,

Thank you for meeting with me at the Blue Ridge Textile Printers facility, located in Statesville, NC on March 17, 2016. Based on the meeting, the facility still contains materials that need proper management to ensure they are properly containerized, handled, and disposed.

It is my understanding that the facility ceased operations in 2001 and the building was subsequently leased for a pottery operation. Most recently the facility is vacant and up for sale. As part of the sale, the property owner is working to have all chemicals and remaining items removed from the building and, as part of that effort, shipped hazardous waste on January 28, 2016 on Manifest #013315449JJK.

During the walk-through on March 17, 2016 the following abandoned items were observed that need specific attention:

- All chemical containers
- Used fluorescent lamps
- Cathode ray tube monitors
- Spilled materials from containers

This purpose of this e-mail is to summarize the meeting on March 17, 2016 and provide information on how these identified items must be managed.

- Chemical containers were observed throughout the facility (this includes all chemical containers) –
 - Identify usable product and managed it as product.
 - Conduct a waste determination on all waste materials, including contents of unidentified containers, and managed for proper disposal.
 - Provide copies of all analytical results and hazardous waste disposal manifest/bill of lading for all waste determinations and disposal to Ms. Goldman with NCDEQ.
- Used fluorescent lamps –
 - Used lamps may be managed as universal waste that will be sent for recycling.
 - The lamps must be containerized in a closed container.
 - The container must be labeled as “Universal Waste Lamps”, “Waste Lamps”, or “Used Lamps”.
 - Visit: <http://www.p2pays.org/dmrm/start.aspx> NC Recycling Markets Directory. Step 1: Fluorescent Lights, Step 2: Tubes. This will bring up a list of companies that should be able to assist you with the proper recycling of used lamps. None of the companies are endorsed or recommended by NCDEQ.
 - Provide copies of all bill of lading/receipts for all universal waste lamp shipments to Ms. Goldman with NCDEQ.
- Cathode ray tube monitors –
 - There were approximately 15 CRT monitors observed throughout the facility. The glass tube is leaded with other hazardous materials present throughout the monitor. These must be managed properly.

 - We discussed that the local solid waste facility may take the CRTs for a fee. The solid waste program may be a residential program and the facility’s monitors are from a business.
 - Try a quick internet search for something like “North Carolina CRT Recycling” for companies that may be able to manage the CRTs.
 - Provide copies of all bill of lading/receipts for the CRTs to Ms. Goldman with NCDEQ.
- Spilled chemicals –

- There were several observed spills of material in the center of the facility where it appears an industrial process took place.
- All spilled material must be containerized with a waste determination.
- Conduct a waste determination on the material and managed for proper disposal.
- Provide copies of analytical results and hazardous waste disposal manifest/bill of lading for all waste determinations and disposal to Ms. Goldman with NCDEQ.

This material must be managed for proper offsite recycling or disposal by April 25, 2016. A compliance evaluation inspection (CEI) will be conducted after April 25, 2016 to confirm all chemicals, CRTs, used lamps and chemical spills have been removed from the site. Any violations found during the CEI will be subject to enforcement.
